#### An Enhanced Life - Volkssporting Did It!

I have always enjoyed walking. I was born in Trenton, New Jersey, and lived there for my first 25 years. There were plenty of opportunities to walk then. I never rode a school bus. Elementary school was a half mile each way, high school was a mile and a half each way, and the movies downtown were a 4.5-mile round trip. I commuted daily to college by train and that involved 5 miles of walking from home to station and station to school and back. I met Barbara in 1958, and we walked every street in her small hometown, Roebling, New Jersey, twice on a cold November night. In 1989 I was looking for more than walking the neighborhood. At an October business meeting in San Antonio, we had a guided walk at 6 AM on each of four mornings. Our leader told us that she was an AVA member and suggested that we look for club events in our local paper.

In the meantime we had signed up for a 100 mile hiking trip in the Cotswolds in England the following summer. Now we needed something to get us into shape. In the spring of the following year, Barbara, Kathryn, and I experienced our first Volkssport event in Hamilton, Massachusetts, sponsored by the Two Town Walking Club. It rained, but it was fun and we tested our foul weather gear for the hiking trip. We bought books and tried another walk in Lowell, Massachusetts. This time it really rained. We were hooked! We began to attend events at a greater distance. We walked in New Hampshire, southern Maine, and Rhode Island where Beryl Wolf of ESCV had set up a walk in Bristol. I realized that the entire program was based on unpaid volunteers who generously gave their time and energy to keep the clubs going. I volunteered. I was president of Two Town Walking Club for nine years. During that time I was invited to walk in Williamstown by Beryl Wolf and met Ron Hersh and members of ESCV. The following year we went to a four walk event in the Rhinebeck area sponsored by ESCV and West Point. Beryl encouraged me to run for NERD, and I served two terms. Beryl also encouraged me to try a Walking Adventures Alpine trip to Europe. We thought that we would not know any of our travel mates, but Bob McElroy was there with us.

Volkssporting participation seemed to shrink distance. Now it seems like nothing to travel to nearby states. Eventually I was awarded a "free" umbrella during the ESCV challenge year. I saw many places that I would have never tried to see, and the walks were wonderful experiences. The opportunities allowed me to walk Volkssporting events in all 50 states (I have six capitals to go), 10 Canadian provinces and 28 countries on four continents. I am currently co-POC with daughter Kathryn for the Historic Danvers Walk and volunteer to help with other walks as well. I have met many wonderful people in our walking community. These friendships are the important part of Volkssporting. I am convinced that if I were anywhere and had a problem I could call a POC or club officer and get helpful advice. We are a family and many others have said as much.

Volkssporting has kept me busy. There have been times when my children have called and left a plaintive message, "When are you going to be home?" Now they are into the sport as well and do their share of volunteering. I do like to take walking trips. My first two were with Wandering Mainiacs and Dave Muzzi to Ottawa one year for the tulip festival and to Quebec the following year. Walking Adventures has also been a good source of fun. I really have to thank Marion Burns and her Travelwalk club for some of the most wonderful experiences of walking and travel. Marion knew how to get the right balance between walking and some other wonderful experiences integrated into a tour. On my first trip with Marion we toured the Jello Museum in LeRoy, New York, and had dinner overlooking Niagara Falls. Marion's Lincoln trip was so well put together and showed the right way to do some detailed research before coming up with a trip. The California trip was unbeatable. I once organized a trip to Martha's Vineyard for 12 people in a van, and I can't imagine what planning goes into more complex trips like the Travelwalk tours! Thank you Marion!

In 1999, we went to the AVA convention in Muncie, Indiana. We were invited to join the ESCV folks at the first walk in Louisville, Kentucky, and take the luncheon cruise on the Ohio River. Our daughter, Kathryn looked at our map before the trip and saw that we would do all of the convention walks so that we could get to Michigan and Illinois. She said that we could also pick up Wisconsin and as long as we were that far, why not continue to Minnesota, then North Dakota, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. Great idea, we did it! In 2006 we sought a tour of the Lewis & Clark route and there were none that year. We did it ourselves. It was wonderful to drive all the way to Seaside, Oregon, and back. Lastly, I want to mention why we love to drive to New York and walk with ESCV. The Hudson Valley is a beautiful area and the fellow club members are fun to walk with. We always enjoy ourselves when we walk with you. What would we be doing without Volkssporting? We would have missed knowing some great people, might be exercising a lot less, and not have had anywhere near the fun of the last 25 years.

# Try This Trail . . .

When Linda asked me to write an article about a memorable walk I had taken, I thought it would be a cinch to choose one out of the hundreds our family has participated in during 25 years of Volksmarching. Then I sat down to contemplate a choice and couldn't decide because there have been so many wonderful experiences I have had walking all over the world as well as in the U.S. I decided to mention two unique walks that were both magical. Each was from a different part of the world, yet both shared many similarities. See if you agree.

Joe and I were on a WAI walking tour in 2003 that included a 10 km walk rated 4 in Bryce Canyon National Park. This is a red rock wonderland that was carved by erosive weathering. The walk started from Fairyland

Point on the canyon rim at 7,400 feet elevation and went up to over 9,300 feet along the canyon rim. Weathering and erosion carved shapes of columns, castles, arches, bridges, and thousands of rock formations called "hoodoos." Bryce Canyon has been called a "Silent City," but I don't agree. Some of the hoodoos resembled people (Queen Victoria), and the ever-changing shadows from the sun and clouds enhanced the fanciful architecture. All the formations have a color range that changes as the day progresses.



I found myself mesmerized by the hoodoos. One tale we were told was that the god Coyote was upset that the people had become lazy, so he turned the people into stone. One of our fellow travelers who was also in



awe of the gorgeous scenery and views said, "god Coyote outdid himself." I felt a tremendous urge to take a trail down into the canyon and walk among the hoodoos, but we could only stay on the canyon rim due to a time schedule. I kept telling Joe that "someday" I wanted to return and fulfill that dream. Our walk continued along the rim, and we encountered ponderosa pine and juniper as well as flowers and birds. This is certainly not a "silent city."

My dream to walk among the hoodoos was fulfilled when Joe and I took a Travelwalk tour with Marion Burns in 2008. Thank you, Marion! Joe and I were the "sweeps" for the group doing the Navajo Trail that was combined with the Queen's Garden Trail. We encountered many foreign tourists along the trails, and they, as well as we, were amazed and impressed with the unbelievable views. It seemed that every bend in the Navajo trail brought more fantastic views, and this walk down to the main amphitheater of the park gave all of us an opportunity to examine the chasms, arches, spires, and, yes, the hoodoos that form this magnificent landscape. Being down in the canyon among the hoodoos was every bit as thrilling as I had expected. Joe was a good sport... I purchased him a Bryce Canyon hat which he wears on occasion to please me... I hope Joe and the hat never wear out!

In 2011, Joe, Kathryn, and I did a WAI 10 km walk in Cappadocia, Turkey. It is hard to do justice to the air of mystery that pervades this area. The landscape was created when ash from erupting volcanoes solidified into formations known as "fairy chimneys." Early residents had the belief that these were the chimneys of fairies who lived underground. Christian hermits carved chapels and living spaces into them, and some of these chimneys continue to house families today. In some areas there are entire rock-hewn underground cities with a maze of living quarters.



Christians who were hiding from persecution lived here in the 1300's. We crawled into some of the churches that still contained frescoes and paintings on the walls. It was difficult for some of our group to navigate the narrow and low passages, and at times some were on their hands and knees. The lunar-type landscape and cold weather added to the mystic aura of this enchanted area. We ended the walk in deep contemplation. You would have to see it in person to understand my feelings about this haunting and mysterious part of the world.

As an aside... we flew home in November with a lay-over at Heathrow Airport outside of London. PURPLE Christmas trees decorated the terminal... what a mood-breaker!!!!!!

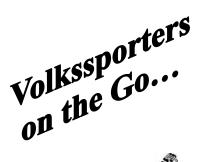
